

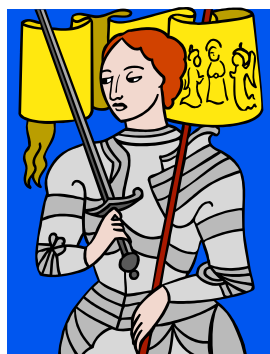


Saint Report

*Holy Spirit Faith Formation
Second Year Confirmation*



- Pick a confirmation name from one of the Saints. The vast majority of candidates pick a new name of their own, or you may decide to simply “affirm” your baptismal first or middle name. You still have to submit a report, either way.
- Take some time for your research. Your choice will put you in touch with a spiritual friend for life! There are many books in the parish library, worth a visit. If you have internet access, see step 3.

- Write about the Saint’s story, background, and what drew your attention. Your report should be at least 2 pages typed or 1 ½ handwritten. Make sure you double space your typed report. Also, insert a header on your paper. With out the proper labeling we will not be able to give you credit.

- Your confirmation name and report are **REQUIRED** to be confirmed! Give it an honest effort and you will be spiritually enriched, especially on your Confirmation day.

Tips on Writing your Saint Report

The report will flow quickly if you try to answer some questions as you write it:

Who was the Saint: full name, dates, country, etc.?

What did he or she do to make him or her a Saint?

What do you admire about him or her?

Why did you choose this Saint?

Is there a symbol or feast day for your Saint?

Is your Saint a patron saint? Of whom?

Turn in the report on TBA (**See Events Calendar**)

Pick a Saint that you want to remember in your prayers:

Choose a Saint that leads you, models the person you want to be like, or maybe a Saint who had the same struggles as you and had a way of working with those struggles.

Joan of Arc was a teenager, yet she led the French army before her death. The courageous story of a young lady named Maria Goretti is very moving. St. Lorenzo Ruiz, the first Filipino saint, was martyred in 1637. Pope John Paul II canonized him in 1987.

If you allow some time to explore the Saints, you will find many interesting stories and it should be enjoyable for you to make a new spiritual friend with your choice. Think of the spiritual rewards!

Receiving the Sacrament of Confirmation is a very moving experience...having your new spiritual friend along with you is part of it!
